LITERACY AND NUMERACY

What Parents can do

Parents' and carers' support and encouragement are vital to their child's education. There are everyday ways that parents can help their children improve their literacy and numeracy skills. Parents can

- * draw attention to the literacy and numeracy that happens in daily life
- *be positive about learning mathematics
- * read with their child from books and magazines to maps and timetables
- * encourage their child to talk about their experiences
- * value books and learning
- * encourage their child to use the library for pleasure as well as to find information
- * stay in touch with their child's school and school activities at both primary and secondary school
- * focus on literacy and numeracy development in talks with classroom teachers
- * be positive about school and learning.
