CAN'T SEE THE WOOD FOR THE TREES

It's many a year since much of this property has hosted the canopy of stately trees. The canefields have given way to a school campus and the development of an urban symbiosis.

Mr. John Popham has recently entered upon the scene to implement a few initiatives that include a substantial landscaping programme, training and employment strategies and inclusive, hands-on experience in nursery skills. Ned Ingui, Jackson Baker and Samuel David are the first turners of the soil. Allan Ambrym and Adam McGreen had an introductory phase previously but went to another programme maybe where the grass is greener.

The new Library complex has been landscaped with Desert Roses, a range of native and exotic trees including Mimusops, Syzigium (lilly-pillies) and a Tabebuia (Brazil) with extravagant golden flowers annually.

Skills that the boys have acquired how to place plants in appropriate spaces; recognize different plants, trees and shrubs; planting, fertilizing, pruning marcotting - propagation technique

A visit to Mad About Plants Wholesale Nursery showed the boys how a nursery operated. The boys were able to talk to Torres Strait Islander employees and could see the prospects that could be available in future.



The owner for the nursery was also supportive and keen to encourage the boys about future employment.

A trip to the Botanic Gardens showed the boys rare and beautiful plants which they had never seen before in their lives.

MULTILIT



On Tuesdays and Thursdays, volunteers Mr Barry and Ms Betty have been working with mainly primary students to assist them with their reading. The program being used is MULTILIT (Making Up for Lost Time in Literacy). It was developed by Macquarie University to

assist students who had missed some literacy basics possibly related to changing schools too often, irregular attendance, or hearing problems that had not been diagnosed or treated. The MULITLIT program teaches 300 sight words and word attack strategies that permit students to work out words that they do not already know.

On Mondays and Wednesdays, Ms Larina, Ms Carol, Ms Sherral and others use MULITLIT with the same students so that they get plenty of practice.

MULTILIT does not teach reading comprehension or thinking skills but it empowers students with word recognition, so when students finish their MULTILIT session, they read SAFARI readers to develop comprehension skills.

Ms Betty, who says "it is exciting to see students' word skills improving and their growth in self confidence". is seen here working with Christine Fourmile. Mr Barry is working with Johnathon Bounghi and says "the students enjoy working with the carefully constructed program and are excited as they see their own progress".

Many teachers and assistant teachers have been skilled in the use of MULTILIT, so many students are gaining its critical skills.
