PENRITH PANTHERS POUNCE



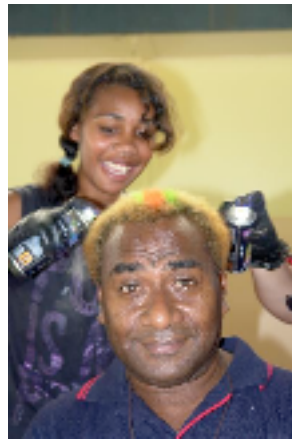

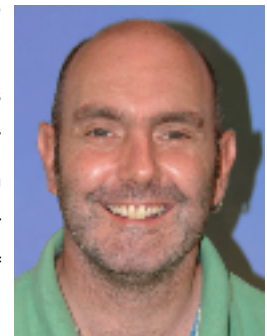
